MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



The Protracted conflict in South Sudan has caused erosion of physical and social infrastructure, death and displacement of over 4.3 million people within and outside the Country. Internally displaced persons constitute 1.76 million. Unfortunately, many other challenges from spontaneous armed clashes between different forces, floods, and cattle raids have continued despite renewed calls and hope for peace in South Sudan. This has posed significant humanitarian crisis as livelihoods deteriorate while the affected persons-in-need have limited or no access to life-saving resources.

UNKEA with support of her international donor partners and the United Nations worked tirelessly to provide immediate relief and build local resilience capacities in targeted locations. In 2018, UNKEA was faced with a delicate balance of addressing humanitarian and regular programming needs. A good proportion of resources were channeled to deliver humanitarian assistance. The unrestricted and unconditional cash transfer programming provided life-saving assistance to the most vulnerable households as it helped beneficiary households purchase food, medical care, and basic items. In coping with the need to revitalize productivity & trade, UNKEA provided seeds, tools, fishing kits, training and market support to more than 17907 targeted persons. Health and nutrition was a key priority in 2018. More than 270,000 individuals received curative health assistance, preventive health services, and participated in health education and several health surveillance activities. This could only be complete with a matching nutrition intervention. A robust team of nutrition personnel delivered different packages of nutrition assistance to 109866 children and caregivers.

All these achievements could not be possible without the generous financial, technical, and logistical support of partners. UNKEA is grateful to The Carter Centre, DCA, DANIDA, Diakonie, GOAL, DFID, SSHF, UNICEF, World Bank, WHO, World Vision, Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, USAID and UNDP. Each of our partners played a key role in contributing technical expertise to UNKEA staff, providing supplies for health and nutrition facilities, inputs through in-kind assistance, and funds towards required intervention costs.

This report therefore presents an account of what has been achieved in 2018. It presents a summary of what UNKEA was able to accomplish in different sectors and endeavors. Given where we are, we are optimistic of achieving even more in 2019.

HEALTH INTERVENTIONS

Between January and December 2018, UNKEA supported 24 health facilities, four mobile health units, three county SIA (Supplementary immunization Activities) campaigns, and disease surveillance in 10 counties that include Ulang, Nasir/Luakpiny, Longechuk, Maiwut, Pochalla, Akobo, Piggi, Fangak, Uror, and Nyirol. Through 6 projects, UNKEA health teams reached out to 243,300 beneficiaries with services ranging from medical consultations & treatment, vaccinations, maternal health, and disease surveillance (guinea worm and acute flaccid paralysis), among others.


Guinea Worm Eradication Program

Guinea worm Eradication program supported by The Carter Centre in 5 border counties of Pochalla, Ulang, Nasir, Longechuk and Maiwut.

Summary of results

Functional surveillance infrastructure comprised of 121 reporting units, 350 villages volunteer's/area supervisors, 280 Boma health workers, a 24-hour investigation timeline for rumors, and cross border coordination between Ethiopia and South Sudan.

At the onset of the year, it was clear there is limited knowledge and community awareness on guinea worm. To address this, UNKEA rolled out awareness campaign, integrated cash reward modalities in its activities, and trained key stakeholders in the targeted counties. A total of 29 Payam surveillance officers, 350 Village Volunteers/Areas Supervisors, and 280 Boma Health Teams/Health Worker received training in their respective localities.

Acute Flaccid Paralysis Surveillance

Community based surveillance (CBS) of acute flaccid paralysis (AFP) funded by Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation (BMGF) through Core Group/World Vision. UNKEA commenced AFP surveillance in 2015 and has since continued through 2018. Ten counties have been covered with a robust surveillance infrastructure that works jointly with WHO and national public health laboratory in Juba. Through this project, UNKEA also benefits from the experienced team of McKing Consultants who provide technical support to the implementing team.

Summary of results


- Total of 140 suspect cases reported. 71/140 validated as true AFP cases by WHO/CBS technical team.
- Active surveillance network of 990 key informants, 66 payam assistants, 10 county supervisors.
- Community engagements through 1061 meetings with 41,234 local leaders and women groups reached in 10 counties of Ulang, Nasir/Luakpiny, Longechuk, Maiwut, Pochalla, Akobo, Piggi, Fangak, Uror, and Nyirol.
- ♣ Monthly county-level stakeholder gatherings from 372 meetings cumulatively held throughout the year drew 7936 participants to improve coordination, supervision, and response time.



Curative Health Care and Prevention


Nasir County, Upper Nile State is one county that faced humanitarian crises that emerged from armed clashes between government and opposition forces in February 2018; influx of displaced persons from neighboring Akobo County; and strong floods that destroyed lots of household & communal properties. The resulting deterioration of livelihoods prompted two health interventions funded by South Sudan Humanitarian Fund. Through SSHF funds, UNKEA reached 47867 (25,755 women & girls) beneficiaries with medical treatment, vaccinations at facility and mobile sites, health education, among other health interventions.

Interventions included support to two primary health care centres: Mandeng and Jikmir. Others included 6 primary health care units, and four mobile health teams that delivered services in hard to reach locations underserved by existing health facilities.






Through World Bank funded Rapid Results Health Project (RRHP), UNKEA supported 21 health facilities in 3 counties of Pochalla (Jonglei State), Ulang and Nasir (Upper Nile State). Both medical supplies and direct funding were provided through IMA (January to June 2018) and UNICEF (July to December 2018). Out of 21 facilities, 13 are situated in Nasir, 4 in Pochalla, and 3 in Ulang County. Consequently 95576 beneficiaries received medical assistance. Out of these women & children constituted 74% of beneficiaries (70756) in all the three counties.

Malaria continues to be the most single factor cause of illnesses throughout UNKEA project sites. This is consistently followed by acute respiratory infections. In the rainy seasons, diarrhea takes a toll on the population. This is attributed to open defecation and poor waste disposal. Other challenges pronounced is the poor health seeking behavior — especially for the case of pregnant women. The project team however acknowledges the immense difficulties of movement in these communities, a challenge that frustrates even able-bodied persons



especially in the rainy season. This partly explains the low skilled deliveries despite a relatively higher number of ANC visits.


To address some of the above shortfalls, UNKEA provided different training sessions to health workers during the year. This included BeMONC, ICCM, EPR, CMR, and on effective vaccine management. It is imperative that, moving forward (2019) more focus should include capacity building for facility staff (from PHCU to Hospital) in order to improve quality of health care services in targeted counties.

NUTRITION INTERVENTIONS

Nutrition Assistance to IDPs and Host Communities

UNKEA through assistance from UNICEF reached out to more than 100,000 beneficiaries in the two counties with different forms of nutrition assistance. Below is a catalogue of actions and results achieved in 2018.

FOOD SECURITY AND LIVELIHOOD INTERVENTIONS


Integrated FSL programing

In 2018 UNKEA implemented 5 FSL projects in two counties of Longechuk and Ulang (Upper Nile State). The combined support reached 9831 beneficiary households with wide range of assistance from unrestricted/unconditional cash transfer to crops and vegetable cultivation. The interventions provided both immediate relief and longer term assistance to individuals, households, and local markets. Capacity building was extended to market actors while infrastructural development covered market stalls and stores.
